

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
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#### INTRODUCTION

This report is the thirtieth in a series of annual presentations to the Fiscal Affairs and Government Operations Committee of the Southern Legislative Conference. The report includes a summary of key findings and statistical tables based upon a questionnaire distributed to each member state in July 2005.

Many thanks to the legislative staff and correctional agency staff who provided the requested information. Thanks also to several co-workers who assisted with the preparation of this report: Gordon Monk, Robert Hosse, and Carolyn Nicklas.

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#### **METHODOLOGY**

The purpose of this report is to provide legislators and staff in each state with a reference document that can be used to compare Corrections Programs in a particular state to others throughout the southern region.

A questionnaire was sent to each of the 16 states in the Southern Legislative Conference. The information reported in this survey is taken directly from the returned surveys, unless so noted. In addition to group reporting of like data, selected data from the states has been compiled into a "Corrections State Profile" for each state. These include, but are not limited to, selected characteristics of adult inmates and major state initiatives.

It should be noted that although identical surveys were sent to each state, there might be certain inconsistencies due to differences in interpretation of corrections data. We have attempted to adjust these inconsistencies when making comparisons among states. To the best of our ability this has been done with each state's prior approval.

All sixteen SLC states responded to the survey. NOTE: For purposes of this report "N/A" denotes that the requested information was not provided or was not available for reporting.

# INMATE POPULATION TRENDS AND INCARCERATION RATES

The inmate population housed in state correctional facilities throughout the Southern Legislative Conference region increased by 8,723 or 1.6 percent from July 1, 2004 to July 1, 2005 (based on figures reported in previous years surveys). The rate of change for each state varied widely; from a 26.6 percent increase in Mississippi to a 7.7 percent decrease in Alabama. A yearly trend summary of the growth of inmates housed in state correctional systems as of July 1 of each year is presented below. (The variations in this table prior to 1994 reflect the addition of Missouri to the Southern Legislative Conference.) Note: These numbers have been revised where noted based on adjustments provided by the member states.

Between 1995 and 2005 the resident population of the sixteen state Southern Legislative Conference region increased from 95.8 million to 110.3 million, a 15.2 percent increase. During that same time period, the number of state inmates (including state inmates housed in local jails) increased by 35.1 percent from 455,908 to 615,800. Not surprisingly, the incarceration rate in the SLC region, which is the number of inmates per one hundred thousand inhabitants, increased from 476.1 in 1995 to 558.2 in 2005 and was below the percentage increase in the U.S. incarceration rate, which increased from 400.0 in 1995 to 508.8 in 2005. The SLC states' incarceration rate remains above the U.S. rate in terms of inmates per 100,000 population.

The number of state inmates housed in local jails in the SLC accounts for 7.5 percent of the total inmate population of 615,800 housed in both state facilities and local jails. As of July 1, 2005, there were 46,070 state inmates housed in local jails. Fifteen states surveyed provided projections of the growth of their inmate populations housed in state facilities to the year 2010. These states expect varying increases from 2005 to 2010 in the number of inmates with an expected SLC increase of 17.5% in the adult inmate population. Seven states projected inmate populations to the year 2015. Predicted increases during the ten-year period range from 3 percent in Louisiana to 62.5 percent in Tennessee.







On July 1, 2005, the inmate population exceeded or equaled the maximum design capacity of the state correctional facilities in six of the sixteen states reporting. The percent of capacity ranged from 91 percent in Kentucky to 197 percent in Alabama, with the capacity for the region at 101 percent.

States were asked to ascertain the percentage of inmates housed in various levels of security. The levels ranged from one to three.

\*\*A Level One institution is an institution with maximum-security inmates (extended lockdown and working cell blocks).

\*\*A Level Two institution consists of medium-security inmates (working cell blocks).

\*\*A Level Three institution contains minimum-security inmates only.

Of the inmates in state prisons, 21.1 percent are in Level One institutions, 45.6 percent are in Level Two institutions, 19.0 percent are in Level Three institutions, 3.6 percent are in Community Based Centers, and 10.6 percent are in other settings (excluding local jails).


Of the sixteen states surveyed, thirteen confined inmates in local jails. The shifting of inmates to the local level has caused some jails to house inmates in excess of designed capacities. Of the eight states reporting local jail capacity data, 38,788 state inmates filled approximately 20.5 percent of those beds. Local jail populations exceed or equaled reported capacity in three of the eight states reporting total jail populations.




### DISTRIBUTION OF ADULT INMATE POPULATION BY TYPE OF INSTITUTION

- (a) Capacities are determined by local authorities. State Finance Department (not AL DOC) pays the flat rate reimbursement set by the legislature,
- (b) Effective July 1, 1996, the Florida Department of Corrections no longer rates capacity for local jalls. Local facilities regulate it.
- (c) Inmates are housed in jails only until space is available in the state prison system for the inmate. (Temporary, short-term option only,)
- (d) All facilities are reimbursed at a flat rate of \$22.39 per day except for Work Release Facilities operated by the Sheriffs which are reimbursed at \$18.25, and two parishes who earn an additional \$7.00 per inmate per day through approved cooperative endeavors to provide and capitalize additional beds for the state. All parishes are also eligible to have approved extraordinary medical expenses reimbursed, Orleans parish is also reimbursed an additional per diem of \$2 for medical expenses for state inmates and \$7 for all inmates served by their mental health unit and \$3 per day for the intensive incarceration and Parole Supervision Program.
- (e) Maximum designed bed capacity is the number of inmates the jall agreed to house with the contract agreement. \$31 is long-term rate, but there is a \$24 jail backup rate until processed into DOC.
- (f) TN uses four methods of reimbursement: contracted agreements, reasonable/allowable, contract reasonable/allowable, and resolution.
- (g) Texas began contracting beds from local Jalls on July 6, 2005.
- (h) The Commonwealth of Virginia does not designate a "maximum designed bed capacity for local jails." All jails have a certified rated operating capacity, as determined by square foot measurements of cell, dayroom and dormitory housing areas. All full service local and regional jails are provided per diem rates (i.e. \$8 per diem for local inmates and \$14 per diem for state felons + personnel costs).



Over the last ten years expenditures in the region have increased 58.88 percent. With all sixteen states reporting, the <u>average annual operating cost of housing an inmate</u> in an institution was \$17,187. Expenditures varied by type of confinement unit. The annual average cost of housing an inmate in a local jail was \$10,360 as compared to \$20,772 in a state-operated Level One institution, \$17,779 in a Level Two type institution, \$17,330 in a Level Three type institution, \$12,979 in Community Based type programs, and \$16,691 in other institutional settings. (It should be noted that these costs reflect only those services budgeted to and provided by the respective corrections agencies.)

Additionally, the <u>average annual expenditure per adult inmate</u> for the southern states was \$18,831 with North Carolina spending the most at \$30,838 per inmate and Mississippi spending the least at \$10,670 per inmate. Oklahoma also spent the most on adult corrections per capita (\$133), while West Virginia spent the least (\$65).



# STAFFING PATTERNS AND INMATE CHARACTERISTICS

The states in the region were authorized employment of 112,776 security officers as of July 1, 2005. Approximately 91.4 percent of those positions were filled. There was an average of 5.5 inmates per security officer in the region. State staffing patterns varied from 3.4 in North Carolina to 13.2 inmates per security guard in Mississippi. The average starting salary of a security officer was \$23,204, not including related benefits. Average training requirements were 242 hours of classroom work in the first year followed by 68 hours of on-the-job training. States require an average of 40 hours of in-service training each year thereafter.


For the year ending July 1, 2005, the states reported a total of 8,003 assaults on inmates by other inmates and 4,738 assaults on staff. There were 25 inmate deaths and 1 staff death. A total of 171 inmates attempted escape from prison grounds and 48 of those inmates remained at-large as of July 1, 2005.

# PROJECTED COSTS OF NEW PRISONS

Data was requested from each state on the projected cost of constructing and operating a new medium security prison. According to the information received, the average size of a planned facility is 1,150 beds and the average cost is \$76.4 million. This equates to an average construction cost per bed of approximately \$66,400. Costs per bed range from \$22,393 in Mississippi to \$182,127 in Maryland.


Operation of the hypothetical average-sized medium security institution of 1,150 beds would require 270 security officers, 102 support personnel, and an annual operating budget of \$21.2 million. This equates to an average operating cost per bed of \$18,321 per year. Projected operating costs per bed ranged from \$9,668 in Mississippi to \$41,831 in Maryland.

Several states (four) reported that the probation and/or parole functions are handled by agencies other than the corrections departments. There are over 1 million persons assigned to supervised probation in the region. Exclusive of Georgia, supervision is provided for 189,909 parolees in the region. Based on information provided by those agencies reporting, there are 14,773 probation and parole agents supervising the 1,235,615 total probationers and parolees reported in the region.


On average, there are 83.6 offenders per agent, while the cases per agent are 107.5. The number of offenders per agent ranges from 155.8 in Georgia to 48 in West Virginia. The average number of inmates, probationers, and parolees per 100,000 population was 1,637 for the southern states. Texas ranks first with 2,212 per 100,000 population and West Virginia ranks last with 325 per 100,000 population. The average expenditure per offender is \$978 per year.





This is the tenth year data has been compiled regarding Rehabilitation. Fifteen states reported that they have Adult Basic Education and/or Literacy programs. Also, fifteen states provide some form of Vocational Education to inmates within their system. The number of inmates receiving their GED ranged from 364 in Mississippi to 4,397 in Texas. Twelve states reported the percentage of the Corrections budget allocated to rehabilitation. They range from .51 percent in Oklahoma to 13 percent in Missouri, with a 2.77 percent average.




All sixteen states reported maintaining a prison industries program. Total sales in all product lines were \$487 million for those programs operated by corrections departments. The operations employed 22,298 inmates, who worked an average of almost 7 hours per day. Inmate reimbursement averaged \$.57 per hour ranging from \$0.17 to \$1.00 per hour. State use laws have been enacted by most of the states, with the exception of Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, and Tennessee.

Privatization of services for all sixteen SLC states encompasses a wide array of services. They include, but are not limited to the following: (1) Medical and Drug Treatment Services; (2) Halfway Houses, Community Rehabilitation Centers, and Work Release Centers; (3) Food Service; and (4) Management of Prison Facilities. The total value of these services is almost \$1.5 billion serving approximately 758,639 inmates.

Also reported in the case of privatization of prison facilities is the cost per day per offender (SLC average - \$38.02) and the percentage of state inmates, relative to the entire state population, in these facilities (SLC average - 9.5%).

## COURT ORDER REQUIREMENTS

THE ALABAMA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS IS CURRENTLY UNDER A FEDERAL COURT ORDER FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2005. They have been under federal court order since 1999 and state court order since 1996. The court order requirements include: REMOVAL OF STATE READY INMATES FROM COUNTY JAILS, MENTAL HEALTH CARE, CREATION OF A SECULAR SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAM, AND ADEQUATE MEDICAL CARE.



## STATE INITIATIVES

#### **ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES**

THE ALABAMA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS HOUSES AGED AND INFIRMED INMATES AT THE HAMILTON AGED AND INFIRMED CENTER IN HAMILTON, ALABAMA. THIS IS A MEDIUM CUSTODY INSTITUTION THAT HOUSES MALE INMATES IN SUCH A MANNER AS TO PROVIDE ADEQUATE SECURITY ALONG WITH THE NECESSARY MEDICAL SERVICES NEEDED BY EACH INDIVIDUAL. THE HAIC HAS AN INMATE POPULATION OF 285 AT A COST OF \$36.76 PER DAY, EXCLUDING HEALTH-CARE RELATED COSTS. THE CRITERIA FOR ENTRY INTO THE HAIC INSTITUTION IS A SIGNIFICANT PHYSICAL DEFICIT OR MEDICAL CONDITION THAT REQUIRES LONG TERM CARE. THE JULIA TUTWILER PRISON FOR WOMEN HAS UNITS FOR INMATES WHO ARE PREGNANT, HIV POSITIVE, OR AGED AND/OR INFIRMED.

# PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS


ALABAMA HAS WITNESSED AN INCREASE IN THE CRIME RATE ESPECIALLY AS IT RELATES TO DRUG/ALCOHOL USE. TREATMENT INTERVENTIONS ENABLE THE INMATE TO INTEGRATE BACK INTO FAMILY AND SOCIETY, BECOMING AN ASSET TO THE COMMUNITY, AND A WORKING TAXPAYER RATHER THAN A TAX LIABILITY. AN ADDITIONAL BENEFIT IS REALIZED IN A REDUCTION OF OVERCROWDING IN THE PRISON SYSTEM. ALABAMA WAS THE FIRST STATE IN THE NATION TO OPEN A PENAL FACILITY TOTALLY DEDICATED TO DRUG TREATMENT LOCATED AT VENTRESS CORRECTIONAL FACILITY IN CLAYTON, ALABAMA. # PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

THE ALABAMA DOC OFFERS PRE-RELEASE PROGRAMS TO INMATES TRANSITIONING INTO THE COMMUNITY. THE ADOC PRE-RELEASE PROGRAMS ARE EVOLVING INTO CAREER RESOURCE CENTERS. ACTIVITIES AND RESOURCES AVAILABLE IN THE CENTERS INCLUDE: 1) INFORMATION ABOUT CAREER DEVELOPMENT GOALS, 2) INFORMATION ON EDUCATION, WORK, AND COMMUNITY RESOURCES, 3) DEVELOPMENT OF JOB SKILLS, 4) DEVELOPMENT OF FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT SKILLS, 5) INFORMATION ON TRANSPORTATION, AND 6) INFORMATION ON ROLES AND RELATIONSHIPS. EACH INSTITUTION USES A LOCALLY DEVELOPED PROGRAM AS A FOUNDATION. THE INSTITUTION TAILORS THE PROGRAM TO MEET THEIR NEEDS, AVAILABLE FUNDING, AND LOCAL REQUIREMENTS. ASSISTANCE IS GIVEN IN FINDING HALFWAY HOUSES, GROUP HOMES, OR OTHER SERVICES.



WITH THE AGE OF THE ALABAMA INSTITUTIONS RANGING UP TO 60 TO 75 YEARS, INSTITUTION MAINTENANCE IS A CONSTANT DEMAND ON FUNDING, MANPOWER, TIME, AND MATERIALS. ALABAMA HAS 19 CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES, 12 COMMUNITY WORK CENTERS, 10 WORK RELEASE CENTERS, AND 1 BOOT CAMP. THE NEWEST FACILITY IS 5 YEARS OLD AND THE AVERAGE AGE OF FACILITIES IS 28.

## STATE INITIATIVES

#### ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

THE ARKANSAS DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS DOES ACCOMMODATE THOSE INMATES WHO EXHIBIT "SPECIAL NEEDS," WHETHER ATTRIBUTABLE TO A FACTOR OF AGE, CLINICAL, OR PHYSICAL DEBILITY.

THESE TYPES OF CASES ARE HOUSED WITHIN TWO SEPARATE MEDICAL LIVING AREAS, WHICH ACCOUNT FOR A MAXIMUM OF I 2O BEDS (MALE) AND TWO SEPARATE MENTAL HEALTH LIVING AREAS ACCOUNTING FOR A MAXIMUM OF 98 BEDS (MALE); "SPECIAL NEEDS" FEMALE BEDS ARE LIMITED TO A MAXIMUM OF 4 DEDICATED MEDICAL AND I I DEDICATED MENTAL BEDS. "SPECIAL NEED" BEDS ARE AN ACTIVE COMPONENT OF THE AGENCY'S IMPENDING LEGISLATIVE AGENDA, REQUESTING FUNDING TO CONSTRUCT, OPEN, AND OPERATE A 700-800 BED FACILITY.

#### PRISON-BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

THE ARKANSAS DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS HAS SIX SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS (SATP), WHICH ARE 3-4 MONTHS IN LENGTH AND ONE BOOT CAMP PROGRAM (280 TOTAL BEDS MONTHLY). STATE FUNDS FOR SATP TOTAL \$194,500. FEDERAL RSAT COVERS THE THREE 9-12 MONTH THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY PROGRAMS (215 BEDS MONTHLY). THE CURRENT RSAT GRANT IS BROKEN DOWN BETWEEN FEDERAL MONIES (\$176,058) AND STATE MATCH (\$29,340). ARKANSAS DOC EVALUATES EFFECTIVENESS THROUGH DRUG TESTING, CLINICAL SUPERVISION, MONTHLY PROGRESS REVIEWS WHILE IN TREATMENT, NUMBER OF VALID GRIEVANCES, CLIENT EVALUATIONS, STATE LICENSURE REVIEWS AND RE-ARREST RATES AFTER RELEASE.

## PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

THE ARKANSAS DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS OFFERS TWO PRE-RELEASE PROGRAMS. THEY HAVE TECHNICAL PAROLE VIOLATORS (TPV), WHICH IS A 60 DAY PROGRAM THAT DEALS WITH PAROLE REVOCATIONS. THE OTHER IS THE SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAM (SATP), WHICH IS A 3-4 MONTH PROGRAM THAT IS THE MAINSTAY SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAM OF THE DEPARTMENT.

## CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

ARKANSAS DOC HAS 19 FACILITIES. THE OLDEST IS OVER 103 YEARS OLD, WHILE THE NEWEST FACILITY IS 2 YEARS OLD AND THE AVERAGE AGE OF THE ARKANSAS FACILITIES IS 27.

IN ADDITION TO THE ADULT INMATE POPULATION INCARCERATED AND REPORTED BY THE ARKANSAS
DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS, ARKANSAS CURRENTLY HAS IN OPERATION FIVE RESIDENTIAL BASED
FACILITIES WHICH HOUSE MINIMUM-SECURITY INMATES WITH FELONY SENTENCES NOT EXCEEDING TWO
YEARS. IN AN EFFORT TO INCLUDE THIS POPULATION IN THE SURVEY FOR INFORMATION PURPOSES ONLY,
THE FOLLOWING DATA HAS BEEN SUBMITTED:

This population totaled 1,014 as of July 1, 2004 and 1,281 as of July 1, 2005. The projected inmate population is 1,765 in year 2010 and 2,485 in 2015. The maximum designed capacity was 1,015 on July 1, 2004 and 1,365 on July 1, 2005. The operating budget for FY 2004-05 is \$52.7 million with an average cost per day per inmate of \$45.28. These figures reflect only the Department of Community Corrections. On July 1, 2005 there were 193 filled correctional officer positions out of 269 established correctional officer positions. The entry-level base annual salary of a correctional officer on July 1, 2005 was \$21,194. One-hundred and sixty hours of classroom training is required with an additional 40 hours of on-the-job training and 40 hours of in-service training per year. The turnover rate for correctional officers is 22%.



## ARKANSAS DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS (CONTINUED)



The average age at commitment of inmates is 32 years with 25 inmates being 50 years or older. The three most frequently committed crimes for which inmates are currently serving are #1 Drug Related, #2 Theft, and #3 Forgery. The Race and Sex distribution is 77% White, 20% Black, 2% Hispanic, and 1% Other, of which 77% are males and 23% are females. The number of inmates released from custody in Fiscal Year 2005 for Expiration of Sentence was 79, Parole 1,265, Probation 201, Other (detainers, transfers) 144, and Deaths 2, for a total of 1,653. There were 2 AIDS cases with 634 inmates being tested for HIV antibodies and 29 testing positive for HIV. There were 93 known Hepatitis C cases with All 33 being treated. All inmates are tested upon admission. Neither AIDS or Hepatitis C inmates are segregated.

THE NUMBER OF INMATES BETWEEN THE AGE OF 17 AND 20 YEARS OLD IS 11 INMATES. THE NUMBER OF ASSAULTS ON INMATES BY OTHER INMATES WAS O AND O INMATE ASSAULTS ON STAFF. NO DEATHS RESULTED FROM VIOLENT INCIDENTS AND 1 ESCAPE WAS MADE WITH O INMATES STILL AT LARGE.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

THE ARKANSAS DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS HAS A PRE-RELEASE PROGRAM THAT STARTS 3 MONTHS BEFORE AN OFFENDER IS RELEASED TO THE COMMUNITY. A PAROLE OFFICER, COUNSELOR AND OTHER DCC STAFF AGREE ON AN AFTER-CARE PLAN FOR THE OFFENDER. PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS RECEIVE SUBSTANCE ABUSE, MENTAL HEALTH, TRANSITIONAL LIVING, EDUCATIONAL DETERMINATIONS, AND OTHER SERVICES IDENTIFIED IN THE AFTER-CARE PLAN. ARKANSAS RECEIVED \$2 MILLION FOR THE SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDER REENTRY PROGRAM; A PORTION OF THIS FUNDING IS DEDICATED TO THE DCC PRE-RELEASE PROGRAM.

AS OF JULY 2005, ELDERLY INMATES WHO DO NOT HAVE SPECIAL NEEDS CAN BE ASSIGNED TO ANY ADULT INSTITUTION; HOWEVER, THOSE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS ARE ASSIGNED TO FOUR CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES - RIVER JUNCTION WORK CAMP (353 INMATES), UNION CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION (2,050 INMATES), ZEPHYRHILLS CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION (69 I INMATES), AND SOUTH FLORIDA RECEPTION CENTER SOUTH UNIT (564 INMATES). THERE ARE TWO CATEGORIES OF ELDERLY FACILITIES; ELDERLY INMATES (50+) AND ELDERLY OFFENDERS (59+).

As of June 30, 2005, 11.6% (9,883) of the 84,901 inmates in the status population was age 50 or older.

#### PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

ON JULY 1, 2000, THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS IMPLEMENTED MANDATORY SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAM PARTICIPATION FOR INMATES MEETING SELECT CRITERIA. AN AUTOMATED SCREENING AND PRIORITY PLACEMENT SYSTEM WAS IMPLEMENTED TO IDENTIFY INMATES MEETING THE CRITERIA FOR THE PROGRAM AND TO PRIORITIZE THEM BASED ON RISK TO PUBLIC SAFETY AND SEVERITY OF ADDICTION. \$7.8 MILLION OF STATE FUNDS WERE SPENT FOR CONTRACTED SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAM SERVICES AT PUBLIC FACILITIES.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

IN FY 2004-05, 31,537 OFFENDERS WERE RELEASED FROM FLORIDA'S PRISONS. THE DEPARTMENT DOES HAVE PRE-RELEASE PROGRAMS AND PROVIDES POST-RELEASE ASSISTANCE FOR INMATES TO FACILITATE A SMOOTH TRANSITION FROM PRISON TO THE COMMUNITY. THESE PROGRAMS PROVIDE INMATES WITH EDUCATIONAL, VOCATIONAL, AND LIFE SKILLS TRAINING. THESE PROGRAMS ARE FUNDED THROUGH A COMBINATION OF GENERAL REVENUE AND GRANT FUNDING SOURCES.

I. I OO-HOUR TRANSITION PROGRAM IS A STATUTORILY MANDATED COMPREHENSIVE TRANSITION PROGRAM THAT COVERS JOB READINESS AND LIFE MANAGEMENT SKILLS. THIS TRAINING IS PROVIDED TO ALL INMATES WITHIN 12 MONTHS OF THEIR RELEASE FROM A FLORIDA PRISON.

2. FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS OFFERS 31 DIFFERENT VOCATIONAL TRADES TO INMATES ENROLLED IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AT 28 CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES.

3. A FEDERAL GRANT (SPECTER GRANTS FOR YOUTHFUL OFFENDERS PROGRAM) THAT PROVIDES POST-SECONDARY VOCATIONAL TRAINING FOR YOUTHFUL OFFENDERS 25 YEARS OF AGE AND UNDER THROUGH PRIVATE CONTRACTORS AND ACCREDITED POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION INSTITUTIONS.

4. IN FY O4-O5, THERE WERE 2,286 COMPLETIONS IN MANDATORY LITERACY, ADULT BASIC EDUCATION, AND GED COURSES.





8. THE FAITH BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE POST-RELEASE TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM PROVIDES UP TO 400 BEDS FOR INMATES BEING RELEASE FROM THE DEPARTMENT.

9. THE FAITH BASED DORMITORY PROGRAM IS A 12-MONTH VOLUNTARY PROGRAM THAT SEEKS TO UNITE CORRECTIONS AND THE FAITH COMMUNITY TO EFFECT AN INNER TRANSFORMATION OF INMATES.

IO. THE SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDER REENTRY PROGRAM IS A GRANT AWARDED BY THE US DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE TO REDUCE RECIDIVISM, INCREASE PUBLIC SAFETY, AND SUCCESSFULLY REINTEGRATE OFFENDERS BACK INTO THE COMMUNITY.

II. LIFERS PROGRAM (MEN GOING HOME) PROVIDES BETTERMENT SERVICES TO MALE INMATES SENTENCED TO LIFE IN PRISON PRIOR TO 1983. THE PROGRAM ASSISTS THE INMATES TO UNDERSTAND THE CAUSES OF DRUG ADDICTION. INMATES ARE ASSISTED WITH BEHAVIOR, ATTITUDES, VALUES, PERSONAL EFFECTIVENESS AND RESPONSIBLE DECISION-MAKING. THE FOCUS IS TO ASSIST INMATES WHO HAVE BEEN INCARCERATED 25 YEARS OR LONGER PREPARE FOR COMMUNITY REENTRY.

12. OPERATION NEW HOPE PROVIDES RE-ENTRY SERVICES TO ELIGIBLE INMATES AGES 18-34, WHO HAVE BEEN SENTENCED AND SERVED TIME FOR NON-VIOLENT AND NON-SEXUAL FELONY OFFENSES.

I.3. M.A.D. DADS OF GREATER OCALA (MEN AGAINST DESTRUCTION - DEFENDING AGAINST DRUGS AND SOCIAL DISORDERS) ENABLES INMATES AND EX-INMATES TO PARTICIPATE IN TRANSITION AND RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS INTENDED TO FACILITATE REENTRY INTO THE COMMUNITY.

#### CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

FLORIDA HAS OVER 70 CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTIONS WITH THEM RANGING IN AGE FROM 90 YEARS OLD TO ONLY I YEAR OLD. THE GOVERNOR'S BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SPECIFIC MAINTENANCE FUNDING OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS HAVE LARGELY BEEN IGNORED BY THE FLORIDA LEGISLATURE. CRITICAL MAINTENANCE ISSUES CONTINUE TO BE ADDRESSED BY EXPENDING OPERATING FUNDS.

#### ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

NEARLY 10% OF THE APPROXIMATELY 47,000 INMATES IN THE GEORGIA PRISON SYSTEM ARE AGE 50 AND OVER. MOST OLD/OLDER INMATES ARE DISPERSED THROUGHOUT THE SYSTEM. THE MOST CHRONIC OF THE OLDER INMATES ARE HOUSED IN THE MEN'S STATE PRISON IN CENTRAL GEORGIA. GEORGIA ALSO HAS A MEDICAL REPRIEVE PROCESS WHERE THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS REFERS CERTAIN CHRONICALLY ILL, ELDERLY INMATES FOR MEDICAL RELEASE TO THE PAROLE BOARD FOR THEIR CONSIDERATION. A RECENT STUDY CONCLUDED THAT IN GEORGIA, AN INMATE 50 OR OLDER IS 22 TIMES MORE LIKELY TO NEED A MEDICAL BED THAN A YOUNGER, HEALTHIER INMATE.

#### PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

THE GEORGIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS PROVIDES PRISON-BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAM THROUGH ITS RSAT PROGRAM. RESIDENTIAL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT (RSAT) IS A NINE-MONTH INTENSIVE, MODIFIED THERAPEUTIC TREATMENT COMMUNITY, WHICH INCORPORATES AND ADVANCED COGNITIVE-BEHAVIORAL CURRICULUM SUPPORTED BY TWELVE STEP FELLOWSHIPS. GEORGIA ALSO OFFERS SEVERAL NON-RESIDENTIAL COGNITIVE BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS OF SHORTER DURATION. PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS ARE TRACKED AND RECIDIVISM IS COMPARED TO GENERAL POPULATION. QUALITY ASSURANCE IS ONGOING, PROVIDING OVERSIGHT TO ALL SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS


THE GEORGIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS IS INVOLVED IN THREE NATIONAL REENTRY PROJECTS: THE GEORGIA REENTRY IMPACT PROJECT (GRIP) IS A COLLABORATIVE PROJECT OF A VARIETY OF STATE AGENCIES THAT PROVIDE SUPERVISION AND SERVICES TO ADULT OFFENDERS. GRIP IS SUPPORTED BY THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF CORRECTIONS (NIC) THROUGH THE TRANSITION FROM PRISON TO COMMUNITY INITIATIVES (TPCI); AND THE SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDER REENTRY INITIATIVE (SVORI) AND THE NATIONAL GOVERNORS ACADEMY (NGA) IS SUPPORTED BY THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, OFFICE OF JUSTICE PROGRAMS.

GEORGIA ALSO PARTNERS AND COLLABORATES WITH SEVERAL COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATIONS AND FAITH-BASED ORGANIZATIONS THAT PROVIDE PRE-RELEASE AND POST-RELEASE SERVICES. THESE ORGANIZATIONS RECEIVE THEIR FUNDING FROM PUBLIC AND PRIVATE GRANTS, DONATIONS, CONTRACTS AND BUSINESSES.



#### ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

THE KENTUCKY DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS HAS BEEN PREPARED FOR SEVERAL YEARS TO HANDLE AN INCREASINGLY AGING POPULATION OF OFFENDERS. CURRENTLY, THERE IS A SKILLED NURSING CARE FACILITY THAT HOUSES UP TO 55 INMATES WITH CONDITIONS REQUIRING NURSING HOME ENVIRONMENTS. MANY OF THESE INMATES ARE GERIATRIC IN CLASSIFICATION. THE FACILITY IS CONTAINED WITHIN THE PRIMARY MEDICAL PRISON. FUNDING IS DIRECTLY FROM THE DOC MEDICAL DIVISION BUDGET FOR OVERALL INMATE MEDICAL CARE. THE DEPARTMENT IS ALSO EXPLORING COMMUNITY PLACEMENT OPTIONS, NURSING HOME CONTRACTS, PURCHASING A NURSING HOME THROUGH A COLLABORATIVE AGREEMENT WITH A STATE UNIVERSITY AND THE POTENTIAL FOR MEDICAID REIMBURSEMENT OF NON-PRISON HOUSED NURSING CARE INMATES. THESE OPTIONS ARE BEING EXPLORED TO ADDRESS THE EXPECTED CONTINUED INCREASE IN GERIATRIC POPULATIONS.

#### PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS


THE STATE OF KENTUCKY, DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS CURRENTLY OPERATES SIX PRISON BASED PROGRAMS AND THREE JAIL PROGRAMS FOR THOSE STATE INMATES CLASSIFIED AS JAIL STATUS. PRISON AND JAIL PROGRAMS ARE THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITIES (TC). BY YEAR END, THERE WILL BE 8 PRISON PROGRAMS AND 8 JAIL PROGRAMS. PRISON FUNDING IS THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT BUDGET AND JAIL PROGRAMS ARE THROUGH GRANTS. THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PROGRAMS ARE DETERMINED BY REGULAR AUDITS THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT'S DIVISION OF MENTAL HEALTH. RECIDIVISM RATES ARE BEING TRACKED WITH THE ASSISTANCE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, DIVISION OF MENTAL HEALTH. DATA FROM ALL INMATES ENTERING SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS IS ENTERED INTO A DATA BASE TO BE COMPARED TO GENERAL POPULATION INMATES.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS OPERATES A PROGRAM CALLED THE PRISON TO STREET PROGRAM. IT PROVIDES EDUCATIONAL, VOCATIONAL, SUBSTANCE ABUSE, PARENTING CLASSES, AND WORK PROGRAMS. THE DEPARTMENT ALSO USES AN OBJECTIVE CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM IN ORDER TO HOUSE INMATES IN THE LOWEST CUSTODY SETTING. THERE ARE SOME INSTITUTIONS THAT HAVE MENTORING PROGRAMS, VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS. THE PRE-RELEASE COORDINATOR DOES ASSIST THE INMATE WITH SENDING OUT HOME AND JOB PLACEMENT PLANS. IF THE INMATE DOES NOT HAVE HOME PLACEMENT, THE STAFF ASSIST IN GETTING INMATES PLACED IN COMMUNITY CENTERS. IN THE EVENT PAROLE INMATES HAVE NO HOME PLACEMENT AND ARE SUBMITTED FOR ACCEPTANCE IN COMMUNITY CENTERS, IT IS FUNDED BY THE DEPARTMENT. THERE ARE FAITH BASED RESOURCES AND COMMUNITY RESOURCES THAT ARE IDENTIFIED IN THE PRISON TO STREET PROGRAM.



#### CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

KENTUCKY HAS 13 CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES WITH AN AVERAGE AGE OF 44 YEARS OLD. KENTUCKY STATE PENITENTIARY IS THE OLDEST FACILITY (121 YEARS OLD), WHILE THE NEWEST FACILITY IS LITTLE SANDY CORRECTIONAL COMPLEX AT 6 MONTHS. KENTUCKY'S FACILITIES ARE WELL MAINTAINED BY IN-HOUSE STAFF. ALL PASS ACI INSPECTIONS. THE ONLY PROBLEMS ARE PREVENTIVE AND PREDICTIVE MAINTENANCE, WHICH REQUIRES SPECIAL EQUIPMENT, TOOLS, AND TRAINING.

#### STATE INITIATIVES

#### ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

THE DR. MARTIN L. FORCHT, JR. CLINICAL TREATMENT UNIT, A DIVISION OF DAVID WADE CORRECTIONAL CENTER, IS LOCATED IN RURAL, SOUTHERN CADDO PARISH. THE FACILITY LOCATION ALLOWS EASY ACCESS TO THE LSU HEALTH SCIENCES CENTER AND OTHER SPECIALTY SERVICES WHICH ARE LOCATED IN THE AREA. THE FACILITY ALSO FUNCTIONS AS A RECEPTION AND DIAGNOSTIC CENTER FOR NORTH LOUISIANA PARISHES. THE FACILITY OPENED IN OCTOBER 1996 AND CONTINUES TO BE UNDER RENOVATION AT THIS TIME. INMATE LABOR HAS BEEN UTILIZED IN THE RENOVATIONS EXCEPT WHERE LICENSED CONTRACTORS ARE REQUIRED. A FEDERAL VOI/TIS GRANT WAS OBTAINED WHICH FUNDED NINETY PERCENT OF THE RENOVATIONS WITH THE STATE MATCHING THE OTHER TEN PERCENT. THE UNIT CURRENTLY HOUSES A CAPACITY OF 592 INMATES. A NEW MEDICAL BUILDING HAS BEEN REQUESTED THROUGH CAPITAL OUTLAY FUNDS. RENOVATIONS TO A NEW CELLBLOCK UNIT WERE COMPLETED IN 2000 AND A KITCHEN WAS RENOVATED IN EARLY 2001.

IN ADDITION, THE R.E. BARROW, JR. TREATMENT CENTER, LOCATED ON LOUISIANA STATE PENITENTIARY AT ANGOLA, LOUISIANA, IS A FULLY STAFFED MEDICAL FACILITY. CLINICS ARE HELD ON SITE WHICH MAKES THE SERVICES EASILY ACCESSIBLE TO ALL INMATES. ANY SPECIALTY CLINIC THAT IS NOT AVAILABLE AT LSP IS OFFERED THROUGH THE LSU HEALTH SCIENCES CENTER. LOUISIANA HAS ONE OF THE LEADING PRISON HOSPICE PROGRAMS AND IS BEING USED AS A MODEL FOR OTHER PRISON HOSPICE PROGRAMS. IN MARCH 2002, THE PROGRAM WAS RECOMMENDED FOR LICENSURE BY THE LOUISIANA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HOSPITALS.

#### PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

EVERY INSTITUTION HAS SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS. EACH INSTITUTION ALSO PROVIDES PRE-RELEASE COUNSELING SERVICES. IN ADDITION, THE RESIDENTIAL PRE-RELEASE "BLUE WALTERS" DRUG TREATMENT PROGRAM IS OPERATING IN COOPERATION WITH ORLEANS AND TENSAS PARISH.

IN FISCAL YEAR 2001-02, THE CORE (CORRECTIONS ORGANIZED FOR RE-ENTRY) INITIATIVE WAS LAUNCHED TO INCREASE THE ABILITY AND LIKLIHOOD OF OFFENDERS TO LIVE LAWFULLY IN THE FREE COMMUNITY. SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS ARE A COMPONENT OF CORE.

THE IMPACT (Intensive Motivational Program of Alternative Correctional Treatment)
Programs at Elayn Hunt correctional center and David Wade Correctional Center are
RIGOROUS MULTIFACETED PROGRAMS THAT INCLUDE SUBSTANCE ABUSE COUNSELING.






#### STATE INITIATIVES (CONTINUED)

#### PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS (CONTINUED)

IN SPRING 2004, A REVOCATION CENTER WAS OPENED IN TENSAS PARISH TO REDUCE THE INCARCERATION OF TECHNICAL PROBATION AND PAROLE VIOLATORS AND PROVIDE A SAFE ALTERNATIVE TO INCARCERATION BY ADDRESSING THE REHABILITATION OF OFFENDERS. THE PROGRAM PROVIDES INTENSIVE SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT, MORAL RECOGNITION THERAPY, ANGER MANAGEMENT, AND OTHER SUITABLE PROGRAMS.



STEVE HOYLE REHABILITATION CENTER (SHRC), A SATELLITE FACILITY IN TALLULAH, HAS A CAPACITY OF 260 INMATES. THE UNIT IS ORGANIZED AS A THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY TO HOUSE AND TREAT OFFENDERS WITH MULTIPLE DWI CONVICTIONS OR OTHER SUBSTANCE ABUSE HISTORIES. THE INTENSIVE I 2 TO 24 MONTH TREATMENT PROGRAM CONSISTS OF MULTIPLE PHASES PROMOTING BEHAVIOR MODIFICATION SUPPORTED BY REINTEGRATION, RELAPSE PREVENTION, AND AFTERCARE SERVICES.

## PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

IN JANUARY 2002, THE DEPARTMENT EMBARKED ON A NEW INITIATIVE (CORE), WHICH IS A THREE-PHASE STRATEGY BUILT ON EXISTING PROGRAMS TO HELP BREAK THE CYCLE OF CRIMINAL ACTIVITY AND RECIDIVISM. THE DEPARTMENT IS SOLICITING THE INVOLVEMENT OF AGENCIES, ORGANIZATIONS, CRIME VICTIM GROUPS, FAITH-BASED COMMUNITIES AND OTHER INDIVIDUALS THROUGHOUT THE STATE TO PREPARE AND SUPPORT OFFENDERS RETURN TO SOCIETY. LOUISIANA ALSO RECEIVED A 3-YEAR RE-ENTRY GRANT FROM THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE TO SUPPORT AND ENHANCE THE DEPARTMENT'S RE-ENTRY INITIATIVE. THE PROGRAM TARGETS SERIOUS AND/OR VIOLENT OFFENDERS BETWEEN THE AGES 18-35, WHO WILL BE RELEASED FROM 2 DIFFERENT INSTITUTIONS ON GOOD TIME PAROLE AND WILL BE UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF THE NEW ORLEANS PROBATION AND PAROLE, REGION 4. THE DEPARTMENT'S CORE AND RE-ENTRY INITIATIVE WILL BE IN PLACE WITH EXISTING RESOURCES AND FEDERAL GRANT INITIATIVES. CASE MANAGERS WORK WITH THE OFFENDERS IN THE REENTRY PROGRAM TO DEVELOP THEIR TRANSITION PLAN.

#### CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

LOUISIANA HAS 12 ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES WITH AN AVERAGE AGE OF 33 YEARS OLD.

LOUISIANA STATE PENITENTIARY IS 104 YEARS OLD. MAINTENANCE HAS BECOME A PROBLEM OVER
THE YEARS. THE PROBLEMS ARE BEING DEALT WITH BY UTILIZING CAPITAL OUTLAY AND
PERFORMANCE CONTRACTING.

#### COURT ORDER REQUIREMENTS

THE MARYLAND DIVISION OF CORRECTIONS IS CURRENTLY UNDER A FEDERAL COURT ORDER FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2005. THE FEDERAL COURT ORDER (IN PLACE SINCE 1975) REQUIRES A CERTAIN NUMBER OF INMATES PER INSTITUTION, PROVISIONS FOR MEDICAL CARE, RECREATION, GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES, AND BASIC CONDITIONS OF CONFINEMENT.



#### STATE INITIATIVES

#### **ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES**

EACH FACILITY IN MARYLAND MAY HAVE DESIGNATED AREAS OF HOUSING FOR THE INFIRMED OR MEDICALLY COMPROMISED WHICH INCLUDES THE ELDERLY. A SKILLED NURSING HOME ENVIRONMENT WITHIN THE INFIRMARY SETTING IS NOT FORMALIZED. ANY PATIENT WHO CAN NOT GO TO GENERAL POPULATION, SELF CARE, ETC. USUALLY GOES TO AN INFIRMARY AREA.

#### PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

CURRENTLY, MARYLAND PROVIDES TWO LEVELS OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT AND A THIRD THROUGH A PRIVATE VENDOR. ALL PROGRAMS ARE COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL IN THEIR PHILOSOPHY. THE STANDARD LEVEL OF CARE PROVIDED IS CALLED THE ADDICTION TREATMENT PROTOCOL AND IS OFFERED AT 9 DIFFERENT DOC INSTITUTIONS AND AT THE CENTRAL HOME DETENTION UNIT. IT IS 6 MONTHS LONG AND CONSISTS OF TWO 1-HOUR GROUP SESSIONS PER WEEK AND AN INDIVIDUAL SESSION AT LEAST EVERY 2 WEEKS.

Inmates with more intense addiction issues combined with co-occurring disorders and/or with many criminogenic factors to be addressed are referred to a Therapeutic Community level of care. The annual capacity in this level of care is 636. These communities will offer services for women at the Maryland Correctional Institute for Women in Jessup and Maryland Correctional Training Center for males in Hagerstown.

THERE IS A PRIVATIZED CO-OCCURRING DISORDERS PROGRAM AT THE METROPOLITAN TRANSITION CENTER FUNDED BY BALTIMORE CITY. THE 6 MONTH PROGRAM IS UNIQUE IN THAT COMMUNITY PROVIDERS OFFER WEEKLY COUNSELING SERVICES, WHICH INTEGRATES PROGRAMMING FOR ADDICTS WITH PERSONALITY DISORDERS. INMATES PARTICIPATING IN THE PROGRAMS ARE TRACKED WHILE IN TREATMENT AND GOALS ARE CLOSELY MONITORED. ON A MONTHLY BASIS, ALL PROGRAMS SUBMIT REPORTS ON A VARIETY OF PERFORMANCE MEASURES THAT ARE ANALYZED FOR TRENDS AND IMPROVEMENT.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDER REENTRY INITIATIVE (SVORI) AND MARYLAND REENTRY PARTNERSHIP (REP):

SVORI IS A COMPREHENSIVE EFFORT THAT ADDRESSES BOTH JUVENILE AND ADULT POPULATIONS OF SERIOUS, HIGH-RISK OFFENDERS. THE MARYLAND REP PROGRAM BEGAN MORE THAN 5 YEARS AGO OUT OF INTENSE CONCERN THAT NOT ENOUGH WAS BEING DONE TO PREPARE ADULT OFFENDERS TO RETURN HOME AS CONTRIBUTING MEMBERS OF THEIR COMMUNITIES. THE ADULT OFFENDERS IN REP REPRESENT A SUBSTANTIAL RISK TO THE PUBLIC UPON THEIR RELEASE (1/3 HAVING BEEN CONVICTED OF A VIOLENT ASSAULT). THE INITIATIVE PROVIDES AN INTERAGENCY REENTRY PILOT PROGRAM THAT JOINS TOGETHER CORRECTIONS, COMMUNITY, LAW ENFORCEMENT, HOUSING ORGANIZATIONS, AND SERVICE PROVIDERS IN A STRUCTURED PROCESS TO ADDRESS THE ISSUES OF OFFENDERS RETURNING TO FIVE ZIP CODES IN BALTIMORE. REP HAS CASE MANAGERS AND ADVOCATES THAT ARE EMPLOYED BY COMMUNITY AGENCIES TO ASSIST THE OFFENDER FOR SUCCESSFUL RE-INTEGRATION.

REP has provided services to 350 transitioning ex-offenders through June 2005. The program's retention rate is 70%, and the program's recidivism rate ranges from 16-19%, with technical violations making up to 11-14% of that rate. Of the actively participating individuals: 87% are under P&P supervision, 44% live in transitional housing, 69% have received physical examinations, 13% received mental health screenings, 22% are enrolled in substance abuse programs, and 60% are employed.

MARYLAND ALSO HAS A RESTART (REENTRY ENFORCEMENT SERVICES TARGETING ADDICTION, REHABILITATION AND TREATMENT) PROGRAM TO HELP SERVE THE NEEDS OF INMATES BEFORE THEY ARE RELEASED TO PREVENT RECIDIVISM. RESTART HAS 4 MAJOR PROGRAM COMPONENTS - CORRECTIONAL EDUCATION, SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT, SOCIAL WORK, AND OFFENDER REENTRY - THAT EMPHASIZES THE IMPORTANCE OF IDEALS THAT REDUCE RECIDIVISM. RESTART WILL HAVE TWO PILOT SITES WITH AN AVERAGE POPULATION OF 2,900 OFFENDERS.

IN GENERAL, MISSOURI HAS ITS ELDERLY INMATES MAINSTREAMED IN THE REGULAR POPULATION. THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS OPERATES ONE 3O-BED HOUSING AREA WHERE INMATES OF THIS TYPE LIVE TOGETHER, BUT THEY CONTINUE TO PARTICIPATE IN MOST GENERAL ACTIVITIES. MEDICAL SERVICES ARE CONTRACTED ON A PER DIEM BASIS FOR THE ENTIRE POPULATION, SO NO SPECIFIC MEDICAL COSTS ARE EXPERIENCED. THERE IS ALSO NO SPECIFIC FUNDING OR LEGISLATION THAT ADDRESSES THE ELDERLY INMATES. MISSOURI ALLOWS INMATES WITH SERIOUS MEDICAL PROBLEMS TO BE CONSIDERED FOR PAROLE.

#### PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS (CONTINUED)

MISSOURI HAS 8 INSTITUTIONAL TREATMENT CENTERS AND 3 OUTPATIENT MODEL TREATMENT PROGRAMS PROVIDING PROGRAMS FROM IO WEEKS TO I 2 MONTHS IN LENGTH. IN FY O5 APPROXIMATELY 8,200 OFFENDERS ATTENDED INSTITUTIONAL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT. AT ANY ONE TIME, THERE ARE 2,600 OFFENDERS ENGAGED IN TREATMENT. THE TOTAL COST ASSOCIATED WITH BOTH TESTING AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT DURING FISCAL YEAR 2005 WAS \$7.8 MILLION. OFFENDER SUCCESS IS EVALUATED ON THE BASIS OF THE SATISFACTORY COMPLETION OF THEIR TREATMENT PLANS AS WELL AS SATISFACTORY OFFENDER CONDUCT. RECIDIVISM AND POST PROGRAM BEHAVIOR IS TRACKED THROUGH A PROGRAM TRACKING SYSTEM, AS WELL AS DEPARTMENT AND DIVISION OUTCOME STUDIES.



# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

MISSOURI HAS TWO SUCH RE-ENTRY INITIATIVES, THE SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDER RE-ENTRY INITIATIVE (SVORI) AND TRANSITION FROM PRISON TO COMMUNITY INITIATIVE (TPCI), WHICH ARE BEING MELDED INTO THE MISSOURI RE-ENTRY PROCESS (MRP). BOTH OF THESE PROGRAMS OFFER ASSISTANCE FOR OFFENDERS TRANSITIONING BACK INTO THE COMMUNITY. IN THE MISSOURI RE-ENTRY PROCESS, OFFENDERS ARE REQUIRED TO DEVELOP A TRANSITION ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN (TAP) PRIOR TO THEIR RELEASE. SVORI AND TPCI WORK WITH A VARIETY OF STATE AND LOCAL AGENCIES TO PROVIDE THE SERVICES NEEDED UPON RE-ENTRY FOR A SEAMLESS CONTINUITY OF CARE. EACH INSTITUTION WILL HAVE A TRANSITIONAL HOUSING UNIT WHERE AN OFFENDER WILL BE HOUSED SIX MONTHS SHORT OF THEIR RELEASE DATE. AT THIS TIME, THE OFFENDER WILL RECEIVE INTENSIVE RELAPSE PREPARATION. THE IMPACT ON RECIDIVISM IS ANTICIPATED TO BE A I 2% REDUCTION.


#### CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

MISSOURI HAS 24 TOTAL INSTITUTIONS. THE OLDEST IS 73, WHILE THE NEWEST FACILITY IS ONLY ONE YEAR OLD. MAINTAINING FACILITIES IS ALWAYS AN ONGOING ISSUE. SEVERAL YEARS AGO A FACILITIES MAINTENANCE FUND (FMRF) WAS CREATED BY THE LEGISLATURE. STATUTE REQUIRES THAT A CERTAIN PERCENTAGE OF GENERAL REVENUE BE TRANSFERRED INTO THAT FUND TO MAINTAIN STATE BUILDINGS. CORRECTIONS HAS RECEIVED \$25.7 MILLION OF FMRF TO DO MAJOR MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS (OVER \$25,000). IN ADDITION, DOC HAS RECEIVED \$1.2 MILLION FOR OPERATIONAL MAINTENANCE (UNDER \$25,000). SINCE MISSOURI HAS NOT HAD ANY OPERATION MAINTENANCE OR OPERATING BUDGET INCREASE FOR SEVERAL YEARS, THIS FUNDING DOES NOT GO AS FAR AS IT ONCE DID. MANY PREVENTATIVE MAINTENANCE ITEMS ARE DEFERRED, WHICH CAUSES THE COST OF THE REPAIR TO GO UP IN FUTURE YEARS.



THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS HAS BEEN UNDER A FEDERAL COURT ORDER SINCE 1973 THAT REQUIRES A SET NUMBER OF STATE INMATES IN COUNTY JAILS, INMATES ACCESS TO COURT, HIV INMATE MEDICAL CARE, DEATH ROW INMATES, AND MUSLIM RELIGION CLASSES.



#### STATE INITIATIVES

#### ELDERLY AND INFIRMED INMATES

THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS IS CURRENTLY EXPERIENCING AN INCREASE IN NUMBERS OF INMATES WHO WOULD BE CLASSED AS ELDERLY/INFIRMED - THOSE PERSONS OVER 5O YEARS OF AGE AND THOSE WITH CHRONIC AND DISABLING DISEASE PROCESSES. IN ORDER TO ADDRESS THIS ISSUE, MDOC HAS HAD A LONG-STANDING POLICY OF MANDATORY PHYSICAL EVALUATION AND EXAMINATION FOR INMATES OVER 5O YEARS OF AGE. IN THE CASE OF PERSONS WITH CHRONIC DISEASES, MDOC PROVIDES CHRONIC CARE CLINICS FOR DIABETES, SEIZURES, HEART DISEASE AND HYPERTENSION, LUNG DISEASES AND ORTHOPEDICS. THE MDOC ALSO PROVIDES DISABILITY HOUSING FOR THOSE INMATES NEEDING PHYSICAL/MEDICAL/NURSING HELP OR SPECIALIZED EQUIPMENT.

#### PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

THERE ARE ALCOHOL AND DRUG TREATMENT PROGRAMS AND ALSO PRE-RELEASE PROGRAMS THAT ARE FUNDED BY THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH, THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS, AND THROUGH RESIDENTIAL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT GRANTS. WHILE THERE IS NOTHING IN PLACE CURRENTLY TO EVALUATE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THESE PROGRAMS, NEGOTIATIONS HAVE BEGUN WITH A LOCAL UNIVERSITY TO ACCOMPLISH THIS TASK.

### PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (MDOC) DOES HAVE REENTRY PROGRAMS FOR INMATES. THE PROGRAM IS DIVIDED INTO THREE PHASES: INSTITUTIONAL, COMMUNITY-BASED TRANSITION, AND COMMUNITY-BASED LONG-TERM SUPPORT. EACH PHASE IS DESIGNED TO LAST UP TO ONE YEAR IN LENGTH. THE FUNDING SOURCE FOR THE PROGRAM IS A GRANT AWARDED TO MDOC AND THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES. ONE OF THE CORE ELEMENTS OF THE PROGRAM IS TO ASSIST THE OFFENDER IN DEVELOPING AN INDIVIDUALIZED RE-ENTRY PLAN TO INCREASE THE CHANCES OF A SUCCESSFUL REENTRY INTO THE COMMUNITY.

THE NORTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS HAS THE FOLLOWING SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS:

DRUG ALCOHOL RECOVERY TREATMENT (DART) - IN-PRISON INTENSIVE RESIDENTIAL
TREATMENT (30-120 days) FOR MEDIUM CUSTODY ADULT OFFENDERS. FOLLOWED UP WITH 8 WEEKS OF
AFTERCARE UPON COMPLETION OF THE IRT PHASE. OFFENDERS THEN PARTICIPATE IN 12 WEEKS OF
PRE-RELEASE COMMUNITY TRANSITION ACTIVITIES AT THE END OF THEIR SENTENCE. THE ANNUAL COST IS
\$4.2 MILLION.

PRIVATE FACILITIES - INTENSIVE RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT (180-360 DAYS) FOR MINIMUM CUSTODY ADULT OFFENDERS. AT THE END OF TREATMENT, OFFENDERS ARE RELEASED TO THE COMMUNITY. THE ANNUAL COST IS \$5.1 MILLION.

DWI FACILITY - INTENSIVE RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT (30-90 DAYS) FOR PROBATION/PAROLE OFFENDERS WITH DWI CONVICTIONS. AT THE END OF THE PROGRAM, THE OFFENDERS RETURN TO THEIR COMMUNITIES. THE ANNUAL COST IS \$3.2 MILLION.

FEDERAL FUNDED PROGRAMS - INTENSIVE RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT (180-360 DAYS) PRIMARILY FOR YOUTHFUL OFFENDERS AND SOME ADULTS. SIX MONTHS IN INTENSIVE PROGRAMS; THREE MONTHS IN PRE-RELEASE COMMUNITY TRANSITION AND THREE MONTHS OF POST-RELEASE ACTIVITY. THE ANNUAL COST IS \$0.8 MILLION.

## SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS (CONTINUED)

ADDITIONALLY, PARTICIPANTS ARE TRACKED IN THE PROGRAMS THROUGH A SEPARATE TREATMENT SUBSTANCE ABUSE MODULE, ACD, WHICH INTERFACES WITH THE INMATE TRACKING SYSTEM USED BY PRISONS, OPUS. THE NORTH CAROLINA SENTENCING COMMISSION COMPARED THE RECIDIVISM RATES FOR THOSE IN SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS TO THOSE INMATES IN THE GENERAL POPULATION.



# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

THE NC DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS OFFERS THE FOLLOWING PROGRAM JOB START II, WHICH IS AN OFFENDER-REENTRY PILOT PROJECT FUNDED BY THE NC GOVERNOR'S CRIME COMMISSION AND THE NC DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS. IT WAS INITIATED IN AUGUST 2003 TO ASSIST SELECT INMATES HAVING MARKETABLE WORK SKILLS IN PLANNING FOR EMPLOYMENT FOLLOWING RELEASE. THE PROJECT ENDS DECEMBER 31, 2005.

Ten facilities within the NC Division of Prisons designated as pilot sites for the project were selected on the basis of the high quality programs and services provided to inmates. Three of the facilities are minimum custody while the other seven are medium custody. There is one female and one youth institution.


INMATES SELECTED FOR JOB START II MUST HAVE USED THEIR TIME IN PRISON PRODUCTIVELY AND HAVE BEEN WITHIN TWELVE MONTHS OF RELEASE. IN THE POST-RELEASE PHASE OF THE PROJECT, STAFF HAVE PROVIDED JOB-COACHING SUPPORT TO JOB START II EX-INMATES FOR 3 TO 6 MONTHS AS THEY PURSUE THE JOB SEARCH, SECURE EMPLOYMENT, AND ADJUST TO LIFE IN THE COMMUNITY. OF THE 1 37 INMATES ASSIGNED TO THE PROJECT, 5 HAVE BEEN REINCARCERATED AT THIS TIME, FOUR FOR VIOLATING THEIR POST-RELEASE SUPERVISION AND ONE FOR A NEW CRIME.

## STATE INITIATIVES

## ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

AT THE CURRENT TIME, ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES ARE NOT HOUSED SEPARATELY. OLDER, SICKER INMATES GREATLY ADD TO THE OKLAHOMA PRISON SYSTEM COSTS. HEALTH CARE EXPENSES FOR PERSONS AGE 55 TO 64 ARE MORE THAN TWICE THE AMOUNT AS THOSE FOR THE 19 TO 44 AGE GROUP. FOR FY O4 OKLAHOMA DOC'S PER INMATE EXPENDITURES FOR HEALTH CARE IS \$2,850 FOR PRISONERS HOUSED IN STATE PRISONS.

## PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS UTILIZES "BEST PRACTICES" RESEARCH IN THE DESIGN AND DELIVERY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT TO OFFENDERS. ALL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT (SAT) PROGRAMS CURRENTLY UTILIZE A COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL MODEL OF TREATMENT. PLACEMENT INTO SAT PROGRAMS IS BASED ON AN ASSESSED NEED. SAT PROGRAMS VARY IN LENGTH FROM 4 MONTHS TO I YEAR. DOC SPENDS A TOTAL OF \$1.7 MILLION IN FEDERAL AND STATE FUNDS ON SAT, INCLUDING PERSONNEL AND OPERATING EXPENSES. OKLAHOMA DOC HAS EIGHT TREATMENT (4 PRIVATE/ 4 PUBLIC) PROGRAMS STATEWIDE, WHILE THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH FUNDS ANOTHER 4 SAT PROGRAMS.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

P.R.O.T.E.C.T. (PARTNERSHIP FOR THE REINTEGRATION OF OFFENDERS THROUGH EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY TREATMENT) IS A FEDERALLY FUNDED GRANT PROJECT INVOLVING THE OKLAHOMA DOC AND SEVERAL STATE AND COMMUNITY AGENCIES. THE FOCUS OF THE PROJECT IS TO SUCCESSFULLY TRANSITION AT-RISK OFFENDERS BACK INTO SOCIETY. PROTECT IS DESIGNED TO ASSIST WITH THE REENTRY NEEDS OF INMATES WHO ARE WITHIN SIX MONTHS OF RELEASE, AND ARE BETWEEN I 8 AND 35 YEARS OF AGE, HAVE SERVED AT LEAST ONE YEAR IN DOC CUSTODY, SCORE "HIGH-RISK" RANGE ON THE LEVEL OF SERVICE INVENTORY, REVISED (LSI-R), ARE RETURNING TO THE OKLAHOMA COUNTY AREA AND HAVE VOLUNTEERED FOR THE PROJECT.

## STATE INITIATIVES (CONTINUED)

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS (CONTINUED)

THE REENTRY PROCESS BEGINS WHEN OFFENDERS ENTER THE CUSTODY OF DOC. THE LSI-R AND OTHER ASSESSMENTS ARE ADMINISTERED AT THE ASSESSMENT AND RECEPTION CENTER. A CASE PLAN IS DEVELOPED FOR EACH OFFENDER AND FORWARDED TO THE FACILITY WHERE THEY ARE ASSIGNED.

FOUR TRANSITION WORKERS ARE EMPLOYED THROUGH GRANT FUNDS AT TWO OKLAHOMA CITY/COUNTY WORKFORCE OKLAHOMA SITES, THE OKLAHOMA CITY OFFICE OF WEED AND SEED AND THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH. TRANSITION WORKERS ASSIST OFFENDERS WITH HOUSING, TRANSPORTATION, AND EMPLOYMENT, ALONG WITH ANY ON-GOING TREATMENT THE OFFENDER MIGHT NEED.

IT APPEARS THAT THE AT-RISK OFFENDERS BENEFIT FROM ASSISTANCE WITH THEIR TRANSITION FROM PRISON TO THE COMMUNITY. WHEN COMPARED WITH A CONTROL GROUP IN TULSA COUNTY AFTER A I 3 MONTH STUDY, THE RECIDIVISM RATE OF PROTECT PARTICIPANTS WAS REDUCED BY 15%.

ANOTHER REENTRY EFFORT BEING CONDUCTED IN THE STATE IS THE USE OF WRAPAROUND SERVICES. FOUR TRANSITION COORDINATORS WERE HIRED TO WORK WITH OFFENDERS IN FIVE INSTITUTIONS THAT HAVE TRADITIONALLY RELEASED THE MOST OFFENDERS SCORING IN A MODERATE TO HIGH-RISK RANGE ON THE LSI-R. TRANSITION COORDINATORS DETERMINE THE OFFENDER'S STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES AND ASSIST THE OFFENDER IN FORMING A TEAM OF SUPPORT. THE TEAM MEETS WITH THE OFFENDER TO ADDRESS ISSUES THE OFFENDER WILL FACE UPON RELEASE AND DEVELOP A PLAN FOR THE OFFENDER. THIS PROJECT HAS ONLY RECENTLY BEGUN SO NO IMPACT HAS BEEN STUDIED.

## CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

The average age of Oklahoma's 19 Correctional Centers is 30.84 years. The newest facility was built in 1998, while the oldest is 95 years old. Maintaining aging facilities with an increasing inmate population has become an issue. The Oklahoma DOC has requested additional funding from the state legislature to address the issue. Thus far, Oklahoma has achieved limited success in dealing with this.

THE SC DEPT. OF CORRECTIONS IS CURRENTLY UNDER A FEDERAL COURT ORDER AS OF JULY 1, 2005 AND HAS BEEN SINCE 1999. THE COURT REQUIRES SOUTH CAROLINA TO NOT USE PRISON LABOR FOR PUBLIC CONSTRUCTION, THREAT GROUP MEMBERS CAN HAVE 5% LITERATURE, AND LIMITATIONS ON USE OF DRUG POGS TO SEARCH VISITORS.



## STATE INITIATIVES

#### ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

THE SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS GENERALLY DEFINES ANY INMATES OVER THE AGE OF 55 AS "ELDERLY INMATES." CURRENTLY, ALL ELDERLY AND INFIRMARY INMATES ARE COMMITTED AND GIVEN A MEDICAL AND MENTAL HEALTH ASSESSMENT UPON ADMISSION. A TREATMENT PLAN IS DEVELOPED AND THE INMATE IS ASSIGNED TO AN INSTITUTION ACCORDING TO HIS MEDICAL OR MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS. SC HAS TWO HANDICAPPED UNITS FOR INMATES THAT HAVE AMBULATING, HEARING, OR SIGHT PROBLEMS, AN ASSISTED LIVING UNITY FOR INMATES THAT NEED ASSISTANCE. THERE ARE 3 INFIRMARIES FOR ANY INPATIENT CARE NEEDED TO INCLUDE A CHRONIC CARE INFIRMARY FOR THE INMATES THAT CAN NO LONGER CARE FOR THEMSELVES. IF THE SC DOC INFIRMARIES CANNOT PROVIDE THE SERVICES, THE INMATES ARE ADMITTED TO A COMMUNITY HOSPITAL FOR MORE INTENSE CARE.

## PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

THE S.C. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS HAS THE FOLLOWING SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS:

GOODMAN ADDICTION TREATMENT UNIT - 46 BED RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM FOR OFFENDERS WITH 3-6 MONTHS OF TREATMENT USING THE THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY MODEL (\$0.2 MILLION).

LEE ADDICTION TREATMENT UNIT - 256 BED RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM FOR OFFENDERS WITH 3-6 MONTHS OF TREATMENT USING THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY MODEL (\$1.43 MILLION)

TUBERVILLE ADDICTION TREATMENT UNIT - 272 BED RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM FOR OFFENDERS WITH 6-9 MONTHS OF TREATMENT USING THE THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY MODEL (\$1.1 MILLION).

LEATH ADDICTION TREATMENT UNIT - 96 BED RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM FOR OFFENDERS WITH 6-9 MONTHS OF TREATMENT USING THE THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY MODEL (\$0.5 MILLION).

SOUTH CAROLINA DOES NOT HAVE PROVISIONS ESTABLISHED FOR A PROCESS EVALUATION OF ITS PROGRAMS. SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS EFFECTIVENESS ARE EVALUATED BY MONITORING RECIDIVISM RATES OF SUCCESSFUL PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS COMPARED TO THE RECIDIVISM RATES FOR THOSE OFFENDERS WHO DID NOT RECEIVE TREATMENT.



## STATE INITIATIVES (CONTINUED)

## PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

IN 2002, SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (SCDC) WAS AWARDED A GRANT FOR THE SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDERS REENTRY INITIATIVE (SVORI). INMATES PARTICIPATE IN THE PROGRAM I 5 MONTHS PRIOR TO RELEASE. THROUGH THE SVORI GRANT, SCDC HAS EXPANDED TRANSITION SERVICES ACROSS THE STATE AT SEVEN FACILITIES. ONE SITE FOCUSES ON SEX OFFENDERS, WHILE ANOTHER OFFERS A GENDER-SPECIFIC REENTRY PROGRAM FOR FEMALE OFFENDERS. A TRANSITION COORDINATOR IS LOCATED AT EACH SITE TO PROVIDE REENTRY SERVICES. EACH OFFENDER HAS A TRANSITION COORDINATOR TEAM TO ASSIST IN DEVELOPING AND MONITORING THE PLAN IN THE INSTITUTION AND THROUGH COMMUNITY SUPERVISION.

SOUTH CAROLINA OFFERS A 30 DAY PRE-RELEASE PROGRAM THAT INCLUDES LIFE SKILLS AND A VICTIM IMPACT CLASS. THE PROGRAM IS STATE FUNDED. DEPARTMENT STAFF HELPS INMATES IN MAKING CONTACT WITH NON-PROFIT AND FAITH-BASED COMMUNITY GROUPS. THE STATE VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION DEPARTMENT ASSISTS INMATES WITH JOB TRAINING AND PLACEMENT. ASSISTANCE IS ALSO PROVIDED TO HELP OFFENDERS OBTAIN DRIVER'S LICENSES, SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS, AND A PLACE TO LIVE.

## CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

THE SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS HAS 28 CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES WITH THE AVERAGE AGE OF THOSE FACILITIES BEING OVER 30 YEARS OLD. THE AGE RANGE IS FROM 8 YEARS TO I I 5 YEARS. MAINTAINING FACILITIES BECOMES MORE DIFFICULT AS THEY AGE DUE TO THE DETERIORATION OF INFRASTRUCTURE, EQUIPMENT FAILURE, AND LOSS OF ENERGY EFFICIENCY. DURING THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS, SCDC HAS BEEN OPERATING ON A REDUCED BUDGET, WHICH HAS INCREASED THE DEFERRED MAINTENANCE NEEDS. MAINTENANCE OF FACILITIES HAS NEVER BEEN ADEQUATELY FUNDED FOR EVEN THE CRITICAL ITEMS AND SCDC IS OPERATING ON A REPAIR AS-NEEDED EMERGENCY BASIS. SCDC IS FACED WITH OVER \$38 MILLION IN DEFERRED CRITICAL MAINTENANCE NEEDS PLUS OVER \$42 MILLION DOLLARS IN THE FIVE-YEAR DEFERRED MAINTENANCE PLAN.

## SCDC IS USING THE FOLLOWING COPING STRATEGIES:

- -UTILIZE FEDERAL FUNDS TO PLACE VOITS BEDS AT INSTITUTIONS THAT REQUIRE INFRASTRUCTURE UPGRADES.
- -FREQUENT TRIPS TO THE STATE SURPLUS TO ACQUIRE NEEDED MATERIALS/EQUIPMENT
- -SALVAGE PARTS OFF OF EQUIPMENT BEING REPLACED
- -DELAY REPAIR OF EQUIPMENT (IF ONE OUT OF THREE MACHINES BREAK, THE BROKEN MACHINE IS USED FOR PARTS ON THE REMAINING TWO FUNCTIONAL MACHINES)

## ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES ARE PLACED IN HOUSING SETTINGS ACCORDING TO THEIR NEEDS AND THE RESOURCES OF THE FACILITY WHERE THEY ARE HOUSED. THE DEPARTMENT MAINTAINS A 50 BED GERIATRIC UNIT AT THE WAYNE COUNTY BOOT CAMP. THE RESIDENTS OF THIS UNIT ARE AMBULATORY AND DO NOT REQUIRE DAILY SKILLED CARE. INMATES REQUIRING DAILY SKILLED CARE OR WHO HAVE CONDITIONS THAT REQUIRE CLOSE MONITORING (MAY OR MAY NOT BE ELDERLY) ARE PLACED AT THE DEBERRY SPECIAL NEEDS FACILITY. THERE IS NO SPECIAL FUNDING OR SEPARATE FACILITIES FOR ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES.

## PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

THE TENNESSEE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS HAS A NUMBER OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS:

-Therapeutic Community Treatment is limited to inmates with extensive substance abuse histories. The program length is 6-12 months 7 days a week. Inmates assigned to TC shall be housed in a separate housing unit set apart from general population.

-Group Counseling Treatment is designed for the inmates who are recommended during assessment for group counseling for chemical dependency. The program length is 3-6 months 2-4 times weekly.

-Drug Awareness Program is designed to teach inmates about the dangers of their substance use and how it affects them cognitively. The program length is 1-3 months and groups are held 2-3 times weekly. Drug awareness is not considered a treatment program.

ESTIMATED COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH THE SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMMING ARE \$1.8 MILLION. THE TOTAL ANNUAL CAPACITY FOR THE SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS IS 2,060. THE PROGRAMS ARE OFFERED AT 1.2 OF TENNESSEE'S FACILITIES. THE TC PROGRAMS RECIDIVISM RATES ARE 26% LOWER THAN THE DEPARTMENT'S OVERALL RECIDIVISM OF 55%.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS


DURING THE 2004/2005, THE TN DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS CONTINUED TO EXPAND ITS PRE-RELEASE PROGRAM TO BENEFIT MORE OF THE 5,600 INMATES LEAVING STATE CUSTODY. EACH OF THE STATE'S 12 ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES AND THE 3 PRIVATELY CONTRACTED FACILITIES NOW OFFER A 90 DAY PRE-RELEASE PROGRAM TO INMATES LEAVING CUSTODY BY WAY OF PROBATION, PAROLE, OR EXPIRATION OF SENTENCE. ONLY ONE OF THE INSTITUTIONS HAVE DEVELOPED THEIR PRE-RELEASE PROGRAM TO BE "PAID JOB SLOT" FOR THE PARTICIPANTS.

PRE-RELEASE PROGRAMS ARE FUNDED AND STAFFED BY THE TN DOC STATE BUDGET. SEVERAL INSTITUTIONS HAVE ACCESS TO VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS AND SERVICES THAT COMPLEMENT THE EXISTING PROGRAMS. THE TN PRISON FOR WOMEN CONTRACTS PRE-RELEASE SERVICES THROUGH THE YMCA. IN ADDITION, THE TN DOC HAS INTENSIVE REENTRY PROGRAMS FUNDED BY THE USDOJ, SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDER REENTRY INITIATIVE, WHICH WILL END IN SEPTEMBER 2005. TN BRIDGES HAS 261 INDIVIDUALS PARTICIPATING. A COMPARATIVE STUDY FOUND THAT TN BRIDGES RECIDIVISM RATE IS 29.5% COMPARED TO 53.2% FOR THE CONTROL GROUP.

# CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

Tennessee has 21 total facilities. The oldest is 109 years old. The newest state run facility is 13 years old, while a CCA Facility that houses state inmates is only 3 years old.

## STATE INITIATIVES

## ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

CURRENTLY, THERE ARE 8,415 OFFENDERS OVER THE AGE OF 55 WITHIN THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE. THIS IS A 9.3% INCREASE OVER FY 2004. ONE OF THE GROWING CONCERNS IS THE IMPACT THIS GROWING POPULATION WILL LIKELY HAVE ON HEALTH CARE COSTS. THROUGH A STATEWIDE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE CORRECTIONAL SYSTEM AND TWO OF THE STATE'S MEDICAL SCHOOLS, TEXAS OPERATES A COMPREHENSIVE SYSTEM OF FACILITIES DESIGNED TO PROVIDE A COMPLETE RANGE OF CARE WHILE THE OFFENDER IS INCARCERATED AND PROVIDE FOR MEDICALLY RECOMMENDED INTENSIVE SUPERVISION OF OFFENDERS WHEN APPROPRIATE. ALL OFFENDERS ARE CLASSIFIED AND ASSIGNED TO UNITS THAT BEST MEET THEIR NEEDS, TYPE II GERIATRIC OFFENDERS ARE CURRENTLY HOUSED AT THE 60-BED GERIATRIC CENTER ON THE ESTELLE UNIT. TYPE | GERIATRIC OFFENDERS ARE ASSIGNED TO 7 OTHER UNITS THROUGHOUT THE SYSTEM WHERE THEY ARE CAPABLE OF CONDUCTING ACTIVITIES OF DAILY LIVING, HOWEVER AT A SLOWER PACE. IN FY 2003, THE COST OF MEDICAL CARE FOR ELDERLY OFFENDERS WAS APPROXIMATELY \$25.16 PER OFFENDER PER DAY. THE TEXAS BOARD OF PARDONS AND PAROLES HAS THE OPTION OF RELEASING ELDERLY OFFENDERS ON MEDICALLY RECOMMENDED INTENSIVE SUPERVISION UPON RECOMMENDATION OF A PHYSICIAN. A NURSING HOME IS CURRENTLY AVAILABLE FOR PLACEMENT OF SOME OFFENDERS AT THE TIME OF THEIR RELEASE. IT IS CLEAR THAT OLDER OFFENDERS ARE DISPROPORTIONATELY HIGHER CONSUMERS OF HEALTH CARE SERVICES.




(1) Substance Abuse Felony Punishment Facilities (SAFPF) - An intensive six to nine month Therapeutic Community program sentenced by a judge as a condition of probation or as a modification of parole/probation. The program consists of orientation, main treatment, and re-entry. Offenders may also participate in peer support groups.

(4) PRE-RELEASE THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY (PRTC) - AN INTENSIVE 6-MONTH PROGRAM FOR OFFENDERS IN A THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY SETTING WHICH PROVIDES PRE-RELEASE SERVICES. THE PROGRAM PROVIDES THREE PROGRAMMING TRACKS (SUBSTANCE ABUSE, COGNITIVE INTERVENTION AND LIFE SKILLS, AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE HAS A VARIETY OF PRE-RELEASE AND POST-RELEASE PROGRAMS FOR OFFENDERS. FOR OFFENDERS BEING RELEASED ON SUPERVISION, A RESIDENTIAL PLACEMENT IS APPROVED BY PAROLE OFFICERS. THIS PLACEMENT MAY BE A PRIVATE RESIDENCE OR A HALFWAY HOUSE UNDER CONTRACT WITH THE DEPARTMENT.

#### INNERCHANGE FREEDOM INITIATIVE:

This program is offered by the Prison Fellowship Ministries. No state dollars are used for this program. Male offenders who are within 18 to 30 months of release volunteer for this program. The program uses biblical principles to assist offenders in making good moral decisions and applying biblical values to life situations. Six months of aftercare is provided by the Parole Division through the District Resource Centers.

### HALFWAY HOUSES:

THE PAROLE DIVISION CURRENTLY HAS 1,199 CONTRACT BEDS IN HALFWAY HOUSES ACROSS THE STATE FOR OFFENDERS WHO DO NOT HAVE RESIDENTIAL PLANS. TEMPORARY PLACEMENT IS ESSENTIAL IN THE TRANSITION OF OFFENDERS FROM PRISON LIFE TO THE FREE WORLD.





## STATE INITIATIVES (CONTINUED)

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS (CONTINUED)

PROJECT RIO (REINTEGRATION OF OFFENDERS):

PROJECT RIO BEGAN IN 1985 AS A TWO-CITY PILOT PROJECT AS A MEASURE OF REDUCING THE RECIDIVISM RATE OF OFFENDERS. IN AUGUST 2005, PROJECT RIO HAD 35,512 PARTICIPANTS WITHIN THE SYSTEM. ONCE RELEASED, THE PAROLE DIVISION WORKS WITH THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION IN TRAINING AND GETTING OFFENDERS TO WORK.

SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDER REENTRY INITIATIVE PROGRAM:

THE TDCJ REHABILITATION AND REENTRY PROGRAMS DIVISION AND PAROLE DIVISION HAVE BEEN AWARDED A \$1.9 MILLION GRANT FROM THE US DOJ TO PROVIDE PRE-RELEASE AND TRANSITIONAL SERVICES TO OFFENDERS FROM ADMINISTRATIVE SEGREGATION. THE GRANT ENDS JUNE 30, 2006. THE PROGRAM IS DESIGNED TO REDUCE RECIDIVISM BY BETTER PREPARING AND ASSISTING OFFENDERS CONFINED TO ADMINISTRATIVE SEGREGATION TO SUCCESSFULLY REENTER THEIR COMMUNITIES.

SEX OFFENDER EDUCATION PROGRAM:

OFFENDERS WHO ARE WITHIN TWO YEARS OF RELEASE ARE SELECTED TO PARTICIPATE IN THIS PROGRAM. PRIORITY IS GIVEN TO OFFENDERS WHO ARE ASSESSED AS LOW RISK TO RE-OFFEND. OFFENDERS PARTICIPATE IN DIDACTIC EDUCATION PROGRAMMING FOR THREE TO FOUR MONTHS.

SEX OFFENDER TREATMENT PROGRAM:

OFFENDERS WHO ARE WITHIN I 8 MONTHS OF RELEASE ARE SELECTED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE SEX OFFENDER TREATMENT PROGRAM. PRIORITY IS GIVEN TO OFFENDERS WITH TWO OR MORE CONVICTIONS FOR A SEX OFFENSE, WHO ARE DISCHARGING THEIR SENTENCE AND WILL BE RELEASED WITHOUT SUPERVISION. THE PROGRAM OPERATES IN A THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY AND USES A COGNITIVE BASED TREATMENT MODALITY. PRIORITY IS GIVEN TO OFFENDERS WHO ARE ASSESSED AS HIGH RISK TO RE-OFFEND.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE AFTERCARE/CONTINUUM OF CARE:

FOR OFFENDERS WHO PARTICIPATED IN THE SAFP OR THE IPTC PROGRAM, A CONTINUUM OF CARE IS COORDINATED AND PROVIDED AT THE TIME OF THEIR RELEASE. THESE OFFENDERS ARE PLACED IN RESIDENTIAL TRANSITIONAL TREATMENT CENTERS (TTC) FOR 90 DAYS FOLLOWED BY A YEAR OF OUTPATIENT COUNSELING SERVICES.

WRAP AROUND:

FOR OFFENDERS WHO ARE NOT BEING RELEASED TO SUPERVISION, COMMUNITY SERVICE PROVIDERS ARE RECRUITED TO MEET WITH OFFENDERS AND DEVELOP COMMUNITY RESOURCE PLANS TO ASSIST IN MEETING THEIR NEEDS AT THE TIME OF THEIR RELEASE. OFFENDERS ARE INTERVIEWED BY STAFF TO DETERMINE THEIR NEEDS PRIOR TO THEIR RELEASE.





## STATE INMATIVES (CONTINUED)

## PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS (CONTINUED)

## STREET READY INITIATIVE:

THE GOAL OF THIS INITIATIVE IS TO HAVE THE OFFENDER READY TO HIT THE STREET ONCE THEY ARE RELEASED FROM PRISON. THE PROGRAM GETS ESSENTIAL EMPLOYMENT DOCUMENTS TO THE OFFENDER AT THE TIME THEY ARE RELEASED.

## SUBSTANCE ABUSE COUNSELING PROGRAM:

A PROGRAM INITIATED WITH THE \$10 MILLION APPROPRIATED FUNDS DESIGNATED TO CHANGE BEHAVIOR AND REDUCE THE RECIDIVISM RATE OF OFFENDERS WHO HAVE A CHRONIC HISTORY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE.

STUDIES PERFORMED BY THE TEXAS CRIMINAL JUSTICE POLICY COUNCIL HAVE SHOWN THAT THE RECIDIVISM RATE IS SIGNIFICANTLY REDUCED WHEN THE OFFENDERS COMPLETE PROGRAMS OFFERED AT THE SAFPF, IPTC, AND INNERCHANGE. THE RECIDIVISM RATE FOR THESE OFFENDERS WAS 5%, 5%, AND 8% RESPECTIVELY FOR OFFENDERS WHO WERE RELEASED IN 1999 AND 2000 AND TRACKED FOR 2 YEARS. THIS SAME STUDY DOCUMENTED THAT 16.7% OF THE OFFENDERS WHO COMPLETED THE SEX OFFENDER TREATMENT PROGRAM WERE RE-INCARCERATED AFTER TWO YEARS AS COMPARED TO 27.7% OF THE COMPARISON GROUP WHO DID NOT RECEIVE TREATMENT.

## CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE HAS 106 TOTAL FACILITIES AS OF JULY 1, 2005. THE NEWEST PRISON, HAMILTON, WAS OPENED IN 2004 FOR MALE PRE-RELEASE OFFENDERS. TEXAS HAS 8 FACILITIES THAT WERE OPENED BETWEEN 1900-1920. TEXAS HAS 4 FACILITIES THAT WERE OPENED BEFORE 1900.

## ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

IN VIRGINIA, HEALTH CARE IS BASED ON PATIENT FUNCTIONALITY AND NOT AGE. SOME GERIATRICS ARE HOUSED SEPARATELY AT ONE FACILITY AND OTHERS REMAIN IN POPULATION AT OTHER FACILITES. EXPANSION IS BEING COMPLETED AT ONE FACILITY TO ALLOW FOR ADDITIONAL BEDS AS WELL AS PLANS FOR ADDITIONAL INFIRMARY BEDS. SEPARATE COSTS ARE NOT AVAILABLE.

## PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

VIRGINIA HAS PSYCHOEDUCATION, GROUP COUNSELING, AND THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY (TC) SUBTSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS. COSTS ARE ONLY IDENTIFIABLE FOR THE TC BEDS. CURRENTLY, VIRGINIA HAS I 200 TC BEDS AT A COST OF \$3 MILLION PER YEAR ON TOP OF NORMAL PRISON OPERATIONAL COSTS. 2/3 OF THE FUNDING IS STATE FUNDS. THE RSAT GRANT (OTHER I/3) WILL END IN JANUARY 2006. TC PROGRAM COMPLETERS ARE TRACKED ACCORDING TO RECONVICTION RATES AND RATES ARE COMPARED WITH THOSE WHO ARE NOT PARTICIPATING IN THE PROGRAMS.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

VIRGINIA HAS BOTH INSTITUTION-BASED AND COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAMMING TO PREPARE OFFENDERS FOR RELEASE. INSTITUTION-BASED INCLUDES SUBSTANCE ABUSE EDUCATION, ANGER MANAGEMENT, THERAPIES, CONGNITVIE RESTURCTURING, EDUCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL SERVICES, WORK OPPORTUNITIES, VOLUNTEER AND RELIGIOUS SERVICES. COMMUNITY-BASED INCLUDES THE RESIDENTIAL TRANSITION THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITIES, DAY REPORTING PROGRAMS, OFFENDER REENTRY PROGRAM AT LOCAL JAILS, SVORI, AND RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS.

VIRGINIA DOC WAS RECENTLY AWARDED GRANT FUNDING FROM THE US DOJ TO DESIGN AND IMPLEMENT A REENTRY PROGRAM FOR SERIOUS AND VIOLENT OFFENDERS. IN 2002, DOC DEVELOPED A PROGRAM TO INITIATE PRE-RELEASE PARTNERSHIPS WITH LOCAL JAILS TO PROVIDE RE-ENTRY TRANSITION SERVICES TO OFFENDERS. PRE-RELEASE TRANSITION SERVICES ARE PROVIDED TO OFFENDERS FROM 45 - 90 DAYS PRIOR TO THEIR RELEASE AND CONTINUED THROUGH THEIR FIRST 45 DAYS FOLLOWING RELEASE. SELECTED OFFENDERS LEAVE THE PRISON AND RETURN TO THE LOCAL JAILS IN THEIR COMMUNITY TO PARTICIPATE IN THIS PROGRAM.

## PRISON-BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

THE WEST VIRGINIA DIVISION OF CORRECTIONS HAS INDICATED THAT EXTENSIVE INDIVIDUAL DRUG TREATMENT CLASSES ARE PROVIDED AT MOST INSTITUTIONS. IN ADDITION, BECKLEY CORRECTIONAL CENTER IS A DEDICATED DUI TREATMENT FACILITY. WEST VIRGINIA CURRENTLY USES GRANT FUNDS TO RUN ITS ALADRUE (ALCOHOL AND DRUG EDUCATION) PROGRAM. RSAT FUNDS PROVIDE FOR PROGRAMS ALSO.

# PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

THE WV LEGISLATURE HAS PASSED LAWS THAT ENABLE A MUCH GREATER USE OF COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS AND A SPECIAL COMMITTEE IS CURRENTLY REVIEWING SENTENCING PRACTICES IN THE STATE. THEY HAVE PROGRAMS CALLED GENERAL REENTRY CLASSES, 2ND CHANCE UNIT (FOR PAROLE VIOLATORS). TRANSITION AND WORK RELEASE UNITS.

## CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

WEST VIRGINIA HAS 12 CORRECTIONAL FACILITES. THE OLDEST WAS BUILT IN 1937 AND THE NEWEST WAS BUILT IN 2003, WHICH IS A WOMEN'S FACILITY.
